
From the Ubiquitous UniServ...

While the association is contacted on a variety of issues, and we encourage our members to continue to contact us for information and advice, big or small, our main purpose is, as I stated above, to negotiate and defend contract rights, as well as to participate in any related work to this end, such as legislative initiatives that will benefit our membership.

When issues arise, many members go to their building representatives or other ACEA leaders first. While these folks have committed and volunteered to serve all of us, they too are working like you, and don't have all of the answers. Instead, we highly encourage you to contact us DIRECTLY, as there are often larger implications that your representatives may not be aware. Additionally, each issue may require a variety of different steps to resolve, ranging from informal to formal.

ACEA also has direct access to the entire MSEA Staff, especially the legal department, among others. Above all, we work confidentially, which we find is a key element to most issues that arise. Contract 101

Bereavement Leave

Unit 1: Article VII, C. Temporary Leave, 2
Unit 4: Article 9. 2

An employee may request bereavement leave to attend the funeral of a relative or regular member of their household. Days granted shall be consecutive starting with the next duty day after the date of death of the family member. Maximum days available shall be; Four (4) days for a parent, spouse, sibling, or son/daughter; three (3) days for a grandparent, grandchild, of parent-in-law; and one (1) day for any other relative or regular member of the employee's household. In the case of a delayed funeral service, one of the four (4) or three (3) allowed days may be postponed to correspond with the date of the service.
